



FIRE PROGRAMME - Workshop on Grant Proposal Development 2-3 June 2014, Djibouti.

The Fund for Internet Research and Education (FIRE) Programme will host a **Grant Proposal Development Workshop** in Djibouti from **2-3 June 2014**.

The workshop will be held during the **Africa Internet Summit (AIS) 2014** and the **AFRINIC 20 Meeting**. This event, which takes place from 25 May – 6 June, is hosted by AFRINIC, AFNOG, Djibouti Telecom under the high patronage of the Ministry of Communications in charge of Posts and Telecommunications.

About the Workshop

The goal of this workshop is to provide participants with the skills required to create effective grant proposals to seek funding from potential donors. The two-day workshop covers a range of topics relevant to grant proposal writing as well as a session on how to apply for FIRE grants and awards.

The workshop is free and will be conducted in French. Transport and accommodation costs as well as basic living-expenses are covered by the FIRE Programme.

The communities located in Francophone, Lusophone, isolated and post-conflict regions are encouraged to apply for this workshop in order to receive support for capacity building development to improve the quality of future project proposals that will be presented to potential donors, sponsors, or investors.
